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
STILL SERVING

Many weren't much older than today's Nevada Boys' State delegate. They came from America's farms, the local diners, and every socio-economic class. Some were drafted, others lied to the admissions officers in order to leave high school and serve in the "Big One." The "War to End All Wars" was the moniker that rallied the tearful mothers and wives as their husbands and sons left for the far shores of France, Germany, and Eastern Europe.

They left as heroes eager to stop the expansion of governments and ideals they didn't quite understand. Months later, they would find themselves sitting in muddy trenches in wet wool socks and uniforms that weren't fit for the weather or situation. World War I was the war that introduced the world to machine guns, chemical and biological weapons, and airplanes. Months would pass with progress being measured in inches and not towns, miles, or dead.

For nearly three years, it seemed that the war would never end. Huddled in trenches, the American soldiers built relationships that would last a lifetime. Perhaps the Sergeant

replaced the role of the father the 15 year old Marine Corp private left behind. Perhaps the man sharing your foxhole for the past six months became more of a brother than the city slicker from New York City... a city you only knew of months before when the Yankees won the World Series. In the closing months of this war, the Americans found themselves in Paris holding meetings to establish an organization that never forgot the sacrifices of those who died next to you. It



would be an organization that would guarantee the atrocities experienced for the previous years would never be revisited. It would make certain that those who returned would receive the benefits promised them by a grateful nation. And thus, in March 1919, the American Legion would be formed.

Our heroes returned from Paris and Europe in waves. They would offload a troop ship in New York and be handed separation papers and \$10 to transport them across the country to their homes. When they returned home, they didn't forget the commitment and bonds formed in those trenches. They founded American Legion posts in every town in America. They named them after their fallen comrades. Darrel Dunkle Post #1 in Reno is named after the first Reno man killed in World War I. Without television, Internet, or the modern conveniences we know, their lives focused on service to the community, state and nation through the American Legion post. Weekly poker games would find yesterday's heroes challenging each other to be better citizens. In the coming decades, the American Legion would change the very tapestry and lifestyle of America.

The American Legion would become integral in passage of the GI Bill of Health guaranteeing that the wounds inflicted during service to our great country would be cared for until death. The American Legion would go on to found such great programs as Boys' State, American Legion Baseball, Oratorical Contests, and many others. They would support local sports teams, picnics, Boy Scout troops, and the local Memorial Day Parade. If you wanted anything, the Legion would help, especially if you were a veteran.

But, even the Legion couldn't stop World War II. As the years passed, America's duty to the world community would be tested in such far and unknown places as Vietnam, Grenada, and Saudi Arabia. As each war concluded, they would welcome the veterans' and continue to serve as a place where the returning soldier could find a home. In doing so, they became the largest Veterans' organization with over 3 million members.

Today, the American Legion stands as America's watchdog for veterans' and military members. You see, if you decide to serve America in any branch of the military, you cannot lobby Congress on your behalf. Many young enlistees receive food stamps to overcome the small pay. They must live in homes or barracks erected for their grandfathers and last painted when their fathers served.

But the Legion still believes in America. Members participate in a program called Spinoza Bear that places a teddy bear in the arms of a terminally ill child. The child, afraid as she lies dying in the hospital, confides to the bear or cries out telling the bear her pains. Late at night, as the young girl rests, the doctors remove the tape hidden beneath the bear's chest to help find the true feelings of the child and help treat her in any way possible.

Legion members donate millions to the National Emergency Fund or the Child Welfare Foundation. This money helps communities overcome floods, fires, or other natural disasters. They provide Christmas meals to homeless families and provide an honorable burial for the veteran who froze to death on the streets last night. They lobby Congress for a strong military and fair treatment of those willing to serve and protect the freedoms of all of us. They believe in America's symbols and honors. No organization gave more to the World War II memorial and none have given more in order to pass a flag protection amendment.

They continue with programs such as Boys' State to make certain that the experiences they hoped would never be forgotten are fresh in the memory of the leaders of tomorrow. There is a bumper sticker that states, "If you love your freedom...thank a Vet!" America is great because of our veterans and the American Legion. Never forget their contributions to our society and never forget the many things they do for us each and every day without praise, personal pride, or fanfare. They follow the creed of "Still Serving" and America is the greatest country in the world because of great organizations like the American Legion.


Delegates,














2002 NEVADA BOYS' STATE LEGISLATION

NEVADA BOYS' STATE RESOLUTION # SB 103

AUTHOR: Brian Chan and Adam Meyer

CITY: Anderson

Memorializing the 2003 session of the Nevada Legislature to enact legislation providing for the reconsideration of closed-campus lunches in Nevada high schools.

WHEREAS, the closing of school campuses would bring a decrease in revenue to nearby businesses/restaurants who thrive on revenue from students; and

WHEREAS, closed-campuses in highly populated high schools creates the issue of overcrowding in school cafeterias, which would cause long lines for food, excessive lateness to class, and possible frustrations amongst students; and

WHEREAS, with open-campus lunches, students are given the opportunity to have a "mental break" from school; and

WHEREAS, statistically, school violence decreases because of the occurrence of violence outside the school campus; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Boys' State of Nevada, assembled in Carson City on June 20, 2002, that the 2003 session of the Nevada Legislature is hereby memorialized to enact legislation to provide for the reconsideration of closing school campus lunches.

SB 103: PASSED ON 6-20-2002

NEVADA BOYS' STATE BILL #S.B. 116

An act

SHMMARY

An act to provide for equal opportunity in participation of students with hearing impairments in that interpreters and/or technological devices for the facilitation of communication will be made available to the hearing impaired student for all related services, including but limited to non-academic and extracurricular services, and that the facilitation of the services is the responsibility of the school district.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS

SECTION 1

Education for students with hearing impairment disabilities includes independent living skills and not just academics, therefore, a broad range of related services is required with the assistance of an interpreter and/or appropriate technological devices for the facilitation of communication.

SECTION 2:

School districts should take steps to provide non-academic and extracurricular services and activities in such a manner as is necessary to afford students with hearing disabilities on equal opportunity for participation; activities including, but not limited to, athletics, recreational activities, special interest groups, student council, school tutorials, and clubs (34 code of Federal Regulation sec. 300.306 (a) and (b)).

SECTION 3:

All related services must be provided without any charge to the parent with the local district responsible for providing the relate services directly or by contracting with appropriate contacts.

SB 116: PASSED ON 6-20-2002

NEVADA BOYS' STATE BILL # S.B. 70

SUMMARY:

This is an act to amend the law for the legal age of gambling for the state of Nevada

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1:

Lowering the legal gambling age to eighteen years of age.

SECTION 2:

Lowering the legal gambling age will increase the number of adults now gambling. As a result the increase in the number of gamblers will bring an increase in the gambling revenue.

SECTION 3

This will also bring an increase in tourism to the State of Nevada. This will also increase revenue.

SECTION 4:

This bill is to be enacted upon passing.

WHEREAS, thousands of dollars are big spent litigating the usage of Yucca Mountain as a nuclear waste storage facility is inevitable; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE BOYS STATE OF NEVADA, Assembled in Carson City on June 21, 2002, that the 2003 session of the Nevada legislature is hereby memorialized to enact legislation in the event of ructear waste coming to Nevada under the legislation through National Congress to provide for negotiations between the state of Nevada and the Federal Government so that the state of Nevada will receive federal funding in exchange for allowing nuclear waste to be stored at Yucca Mourtain, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the federal funding received from the federal government be used for education and other necessary improvements within the state of Nevada.

AB 4: PASSED ON 6-20-2002

NEVADA BOYS' STATE BILL # A.B. 37

AUTHOR: Zach White

CITY: Anderson

An act

SUMMARY:

To amend the agriculture and markets in relation to rewrapping and repackaging of meat. Rewrapped or repackaged meat, fish, poultry is prohibited without proper identification.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1:

The sale of any repackaged or rewrapped meat, fish, or poultry that does not display a label that clearly states the rewrapped or repackaged date, new exploration date, and a sticker of approval by state meat inspectors are prohibited. The regulation noted in Section 1 will be added to previous regulation currently used by the Health Department and its inspectors to determine the safety and quality of food retailers.

SECTION 2:

This bill takes effect upon passage and approval.


